Lundy and Atlantic Coast Air Lines -- 26th October 1935



This cover has the Atlantic Coast 1/2 d red stamp along with the Lundy Local puffin stamp.

Posted in Newport Mon with the single ring date stamp cancellation...



Heaton Court Airfield was used between 1935 and 1939 by Atlantic Coast Air Lines to carry mail and passengers 3 times a week to Lundy.

Red LACAL Air Stamp First Day of Use was the 31st March 1939, however this cover missed the flight and was cancelled on its arrival on the 4st April 1939.

Airmail cover from Newport to Lundy with Lundy and Atlantic Coast Airlines Small ½d stamp, along with the Lundy Puffin stamp. The reverse side has the Phillips return address label.



Mailed from Newport 30th July 1937, with the rare winged LACAL cancellation on the 1/2d air stamp.

Mr.A.Phillips Shop in Dock Street Newport used as a tobacconist and for his philatelic dealings as an Airmail Dealer.

Phillips was a prolific Airmail Collector and dealer between 1930 and 1945 posting covers all over the UK and the world, mainly First Flight using his Dock Street shop as a return address. In early 1942 the Phillips family suffered a terrible loss when his two children were killed when a German plane crashed by his house and the children were killed by the fumes that came from the plane.


Last Item Bought: (Roy)


Last Item bought: (Les)

I have recently acquired this cover to add to my Chepstow postmarks collection. I "needed" a black Maltese Cross postmark from Chepstow!

I am also interested in stamps related to Sir Isaac Newton and Albert Einstein and I have been looking for this set for some time. This set is from Nicaragua on a theme of physical laws and mathematical formulae. There is both a stamp on Newton and Einstein in the full set. What is also particularly interesting is that on the gummed side of the stamp is a small narrative explaining about the "scientist and his formulae". I have copied the reverse of the stamps and shown them below. I have seen another set from Nicaragua on medical discoveries, it has a Leonardo stamp connection of course, which also has a small narrative on the gummed side. Does anyone else know any countries which have done this? If so, can you please send me some pictures and I will include them in a future newsletter.
